



Key history vocabulary to help us



Toys 60 years ago (1960s)

These are the toys that your **older** relatives would have played with at your age. Some of the toys from this time in history are **similar** to the toys we play with now, like Play Doh and the game Twister. They might look different to the modern versions because of different packaging designs.

Other toys from this time in history are different because of what they are made out of. A toy ride-on car from the 1960s would have been made out of wood, today they are made of plastic. We would call toys from the 1960s 'old' toys.

Toys 30 years ago (1990s)

These are the toys that your caregivers would have played with at your age. Because of advances in technology, your caregivers would have played with more electronic toys than your older relatives, such as Tamagotchi's and a Nintendo 64 (an early games console).

Other toys from this time in history are similar to modern-day toys such as Mr Potato Head, trolls and the Hungry Hippos board game. Toys from this time are older than modern-day toys but newer than 1960s toys.

Toys in the present day (2020s)

These are the toys that we play with today, in the present. We call these toys modern-day toys. Some of these toys are similar to toys from the past but some are different. The differences are because of:

- advances in technology
- changes in packaging and design
- changes in manufacturing (how the toys are made)

Future toys will be different again!

How do we find out about the past?

We can find out about $\mbox{the past}$ by:

- looking at and reading non-fiction books
- \bullet searching the internet
- talking to people who were around at the time that we want to find out about
- watching video clips or TV shows about the time in history we want to find out about
- visiting museums
- looking at photographs
- looking at objects from the past
